There's no denying that Valentine's Day is the OG for celebrating romance. Tinder, the world's most popular dating app, confirms that the day is as popular as ever, particularly amongst the new generation of daters. There is generally a peak in activity four days before Valentine's Day as singles take to Tinder to find a match. The busiest hours tend to be between 9 and 10 pm local time².

Tinder's latest <u>Year in Swipe report</u> projects that dating in 2024 will continue to be "For the Plot' with singles less concerned with where their relationship is heading, and more interested in creating memorable experiences and opportunities - also known as N.A.T.O Dating (a.k.a.
